

Right of public access

You have the right to spend time in nature regardless of who owns the land. This is the foundation of the right of public access.

The right of public access applies to both land and water. You may swim at beaches, boat basically anywhere and moor your boat to spend a day and night. The requirements in relation to the surroundings are the same as they are on land. Do not disturb – Do not destroy!

You may make a campfire provided the conditions are safe and there is not a fire prohibition in place.

You may also freely pick flowers, berries and mushrooms out in nature. However, be aware that some plants are protected and that special rules apply at national parks and nature reserves.

You may camp out on the land for a day and night. Ensure that you do not disturb the land owner or damage the nature. When selecting a campsite, choose land with a durable surface that is not used for grazing, farming or planting. The campsite may not be in close proximity to dwelling houses.

Driving a motorhome or motor vehicle on the land is prohibited. Thus, you are not allowed to drive onto the land and camp in a motorhome. The land owner is entitled to prohibit motor traffic on private roads. However, the owner may not prevent anyone from walking, biking or riding horses on the road, provided that the road is not damaged.

Do not litter or leave any rubbish behind. Cans, glass, plastic and other rubbish can injure animals and humans.
